- The tenuous relationship between tigers and humans has pushed wild tigers to the brink of extinction.
- Incomplete knowledge on the state of tigers and their needs has made it difficult to set priorities and agendas for action.



Why save tigers?

- National animal and Pride of the nation.
- Majority of tigers are found in India.
- They are big in size, but sparse in number.
- Human welfare and economic development in Asia depends on the same natural and other forest resources that tiger needs.
- Endangered tiger indicates the Ecosystem in Crisis

As tiger cannot live in places where trees have vanished




In turn it secures food and water for all.

Areas with less trees lead to floods and other environmental disorders killing people and destroying homes.




Also forests catch and help store rainwater and protects soils.

Tiger Facts

- Tigers are now an endangered species.
- Today there are only about 5,000 tigers left in the world.
- These tigers would soon die if people do not stop hunting them.
- It is estimated that 100 years ago, there were 1,00,000 tigers in the world; out of which 50,000 to 80,000 tigers were found in India alone.
- According to a new government census the numbers have fallen to 1,411 down from 3,642 in the last major survey in 2002.
- Wildlife activists blame poaching and urbanization for the decline and say the authorities must do more.




What the world must understand about tiger trade?


- Tigers are disappearing.
- This is due to increasing trade in tiger body parts.



- Persistent demand for tiger bone in traditional Asian medicines.
- International trade in tigers and their parts is banned.
- Wild tigers cannot withstand even limited trade in their parts.



- If tiger range and consuming countries do not act decisively and in concert now, the species in the wild will be lost forever.




Traditional Medicines


- Tiger bone is not used to treat life-threatening illnesses, yet use of tiger bone in medicines threatens the very survival of all wild tigers.
- Tiger body parts are also used for "magic purposes", souvenirs, as status symbols and even as decorative items.







Production farming for tigers would be a step backward in wildlife conservation.


Understanding the tiger world. & How can we help save them?

View Points






Interactive Exhibition Panel-


Video Clips












Objective-

Audio-Visual Presentation

The presentation will answer the 3 fundamental questions?

- 1. What is the threat to tigers?
- 2. Why should people care?
- 3. What can they do about it?

The presentation can be shown at suitable places like-

- 1. Exhibition halls in National Parks or Sanctuaries
- NGO's or other Tiger Organizations can use it as a media to develop effective understanding in people.
- Uploaded on Internet, which will allow people to circulate it among themselves through mails
- 4. Can be showcased as an episode on national geographic channels.

STORY

This presentation will address people in form of an interesting story, which will help retain their attention and involve them emotionally.

Brief Story-

The story is about Mrs. Thapar and her kid in year 2020. A wildlife conservationist, who is jobless as the wildlife she worked for hardly exists by then. While being at home and spending time with her kid she discovers that her kid has never even learnt about the word 'tiger', the tiger one of the most significant animal for who's survival she had strived, did not even exist in the memories of her own kid. Taking a back with this thought and trying to describe the animal to her kid, she unwinds her old harsh memories and the inhuman treatment the wild tigers received from people, which further led to their extinction and the imbalance of our ecosystem.


Ultimately the story ends, creating an urge into the viewers mind, provoking him to put a step forward and to help tiger conservation before its too late.





Illustration style


