


2D Animation:


During the time I got to explore two skills for product design working with clay and wood. It was a fun experience to understand clay as a material and how to use it to make pots and mugs.



i had picked a few of them yesterday for my sweetheart, only just a tiny spray tied with a red ribbon, a small bouquet


so we met by night, near a glossy lake and talked all night, sedulously awake by then the roses faded, petals flaked

DE 132: World of Images and Objects

The film Ee Ma Yau deals with death. It does not say much about the particular event of death, but rather the events and emotions that follow death. The film begins with life, as the story quickly reveals that the daughter is pregnant. Soon in a succession of frames, death enters the scene. Wailing sounds, crying etc quickly set the mood of distress and sadness caused by death. People add their own details to a story of death to make it interesting.

The mood of the film is quite simply set by using certain natural elements such as rain and night. Every frame holding a sad moment is accompanied by rain that adds another layer of distress and discomfort to the film. When a moment gets worse, the rain falls heavier, as though nature too was weeping at death. Another element that set this mood was the time and lighting. A lot of scenes were shot at night, the natural darkness complemented death as well as the emotion of the characters being lost. Even the daytime shots were often accompanied by either rain or cloudiness, limiting the light in every scene and continuing the same setting throughout the film.

The film also consisted of several handheld long shots where the camera followed the character to engage us and follow closely. With a more naturalistic camera movement and lesser cuts, the feel of ourselves being a part of the event was created.

The Square

The Square opens with an interview between two characters. The interview aims to find what the museum considers to be "art", and how far could that line be stretched. Christian, the curator of the museum answers the question with another question-

"If we took your bag and placed it on the floor of this museum, would that make it art?"

This one line sets the tone for the rest of the film, and in fact reveals itself in almost every scene.

The Square is shot in such a way that you might think the actors were not given a script at all. Every conversation is completely natural, with awkward pauses and gaps as a person stammers or thinks of what to say. Normally, movies keep their dialogue airtight but this was not the case with The Square. Even background noises were allowed to intrude in the dialogue, be it intentional or not. Fitzcarraldo

The story behind the making of Fitzcarraldo is one of ambition taken too far. The director, Werner Herzog, is known for having an unusual approach to filmmaking- namely one that values authenticity and experiences above all else. His work involves as little usage of props or stage setting as possible, as he prefers to have shoots involving real-life situations. In this sense, his work becomes more like a documentary of sorts rather than a film.

Les Blank created a documentary, 'The Burden of Dreams', that highlighted some of the difficulties the crew faced during the production of the film. One event in particular caused a great deal of hardship- Herzog required the crew to transport a 320 ton ship over a hill. This ship was disassembled, transported in bits and pieces, and then reassembled after reaching the other side. The scene was shot without the usage of special effects, and Herzog believed that such a feat would never be repeated in the history of cinema ever again.

Additionally, there were also a few casualties and injuries that occurred as a direct result of the production of the film. Several indigenous people involved in the making of the film were injured while working. There have also been accusations against the director, stating that he exploits the indigenous people living in the environment chosen for the film.



Herzog had a vision that was so grandiose and all consuming that it left no room for empathy or consideration of the external world, of the people who he would be working with, and of the consequences of his actions. Was it really worth it? None except Herzog himself will know
