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Introduction

Buddhist woodcarving is a traditional way of Tibetan woodcarving that aims to empower culture through designs based on nature. Dating back its origin to the seventh century, the art motifs used bear inspirations from nature, spiritual awareness, and religious symbols. The delicate carving work is commonly found on crossbeams of houses, furniture, doors, and window frames, virtually inspired by ancient Buddhist architecture. At times, these carvings bear philosophical descriptions and religious significance also, as the Tibetan culture is closely intertwined with Buddhism. This unique style of wood carvings is still under constant innovation for higher standards by expert artists who hold vast knowledge of motifs and design patterns. It reconciles the traditional art with the modern, seeking to expand the valuable cognizance of Tibetan values and their expression in art and literature.

The carving bearing Buddhist symbols are regarded among the special ones, as it depicts the core theories of the religion. Tashi Takgye or eight auspicious symbols, namely parasol, golden fish, treasure vase, lotus, conch shell, endless knot, victory banner, and wheel; forms the primary designs learned by a beginner. Here each symbol represents an aspect of Buddhist teaching and is believed to intensify the power when they appear together. In classical times, woodcarvers were rendered the position of architects and also engineers. They took the responsibility of constructing the building beams, fitting the wooden panels together. The wood and shapes used are analyzed carefully to figure the approach so that the weight could be balanced evenly. The application of this style of architecture can be found at ancient temples and palaces even today. Thus with passing generations, the woodcarvers at Norbulingka grasped the techniques of precisely fitting the joints of any wood products without using any nails or hinges.

Training on Buddhist wood carving starts with elaborate drawing practice. The beginner starts with traditional designs on paper and is not allowed to work on wood until they are competent in drawing. For practice on wood, pinewood is usually recommended for beginners as it is much softer than teakwood, which is usually preferred by experts. The student simultaneously also masters the fundamentals of carpentry like cutting and joining the wooden pieces without any hardware. After the completion of studentship, which may last upto 13 years, they are then let to try elaborate carvings of thrones and shrine-rooms of monasteries. Thus the artistry has passed from generation to artisans at Norbulingka, Himachal Pradesh, rendering elegant products.

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Tools and Raw Materials

Tools and raw materials that are used for the Buddhist woodcarvings are:

- **Wood:** It is the basic raw material used for making Buddhist wood carving products.
- **Band Saw:** It is used for cutting the wood in asymmetrical shapes.
- **Motorized Coping Saw:** This motorized coping saw is used for cutting intricate shapes of wood.
- **Sandpaper:** It is used for smoothening the surface of the wood.
- **Tri square:** It is used for measuring and marking the wood.
- **Chisels:** Chisels are used for carving the wood into the chosen design.
- **Handsaw:** Handsaw is used for cutting the wood in different shapes. .
- **Hammer:** Hammer is used while chiseling the wood.
- **Wood Scrapper:** It is a wood scrapping tool that helps in removing the rough surface area of wood.
- **Orbital Sander:** It is used for sanding the wood surface.
- **Pencil:** It is used for tracing the design on the wood.
- **Tracing Sheet:** By using the tracing sheet, the design is transferred onto the wood.
- **Brush:** It is used for dusting the wooden particles.
- **Varnish:** It is used for polishing purposes.
- **Enamel:** It is applied to the wooden product to enhance its beauty.

Sandpaper is used to smooth the surface after the wood carving is completed.

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Making Process

Buddhist wood carving stands out from other forms due to its amalgamation of traditional as well as modern disposition. Their expression, patterns, and ability to be transpired to any viable form won them a unique identity in the crafts market. Generally, well-seasoned timber of teak or pine wood is used for these wood carvings. According to requirements, small planks are made ready prior to any orders, to be shaped into the required size and shapes later. The artisans maintain and reassure the thickness of the prepared structures with the help of motorized machines and tools. Once the rough wooden body is ready, an attractive design is sketched on a tracing sheet to be later traced onto the wooden surface. Here the excess wood is chopped off using chisels. Later the intricate designs are carved layer-by-layer on both sides of the wood. The depth and shallowness on the wooden surface depend on the type of chisel and the creative experience of the artist. Once the carving is completed, its surfaces are then smoothed with sandpaper, followed by dusting. Then the designed parts of the frame are fixed to each other to join in together firmly. Ultimately, varnish or enamel is applied to enhance the look and feel of the final product.

Flowchart:



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A wood plank is kept cut as per the measurements accordingly.

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Products

The wooden carvings are modeled as per the orders from the client; hence the size and patterns also vary as per the requirement. The final price tagged on the product depends on the demanded specifications and also includes the labor charges. These Buddhist woodcarvings are always in high demand and are most admired for their magnificent detailing. Most of the products are bought by Tibetans in Himachal Pradesh. Some of the products manufactured at this unit are:

- Wood carved animals like tigers, horses, elephants, etc.
- Portraits; orders of this are taken up as per the demand.
- Thrones for gods and goddesses.
- Cravings for temples.
- Buddha idols.
- Incense stick boxes and holders
